Vicky Boldo

Special Advisor, Indigenous Student Support,
Bishop's University

Vicky Boldo is a Cree-Métis adoptee from the Sixties Scoop era. She is a writer, research advisor, cultural educator/facilitator and a registered energy medicine practitioner (ANQ) and has authored and co-authored a number of articles on social work, cultural safety, land-based learning and her personal healing journey.

Vicky was a Board Vice-Chair for the inaugural National Sixties Scoop Healing Foundation and for the National Indigenous Survivors of Child Welfare Network. She has collaborated with organizations such as the Montreal Indigenous Community NETWORK, is a sought-after guest lecturer and speaker on cultural safety/awareness, intercultural adoption, trauma, and sensitivity training for various institutions including Montreal's Police Service, Médecins du Monde, Health Canada and educators, students and administrators at all levels.

Vicky provides cultural support to front-line workers in the Urban Indigenous community and was also present in this capacity for the TRC, MMIW, Sixties Scoop and Day School application and consultation sessions.

Vicky joined Bishop's University in August 2021 bringing with her experience and knowledge gained from her time at Concordia's Otsenhákta Student Centre and as a member of the Indigenous Directions Leadership Council. Her first year at Bishop's was very much about learning, creating and building. The Indigenous Student Support Centre (ISSC) was co-created with her dynamic teammate and colleague, Shawna Jerome (BU '21) and they both look forward to further developing strong networks and support to, for and with the BU community.

Most importantly, Vicky is a daughter, sister, auntie and proud mother, grandmother and recently became a great-grandmother. The 30+ years healing journey that Vicky has been on gives her the passion and focus to give back to the community and to use her voice and drum song for those that are still muted by colonial oppression.



Michael Goldbloom, C.M.

Chair, Bishop's Forum
Principal & Vice-Chancellor,
Bishop's University

Michael Goldbloom holds a B.A. in Modern European History and Literature from Harvard University and a Bachelor of Civil Law and a Bachelor of Common Law from McGill University.

He worked as an editorial writer at *The Gazette* in Montreal before beginning his professional career as a labour lawyer at Martineau Walker (now Fasken). In 1991 he became President and Chief Executive Officer of the Montreal YMCA. From 1994 to 2001 he served as Publisher of *The Gazette*. In 2002, he was a Visiting Scholar at the McGill Institute for the Study of Canada. In 2003 he was named Deputy Publisher of the *Toronto Star*, and in 2004 became its Publisher. In 2007 he was appointed Vice-Principal (Public Affairs) and Senior Fellow in Media and Public Policy at McGill University. In August of 2008 he became the 18th Principal and Vice-Chancellor of Bishop's University.

In December 2013, Michael was appointed to the Order of Canada for helping to establish several transformative civic organizations in Montreal and for his dedication to building bridges between the city's English- and French-speaking communities.

Michael has an extensive record of community leadership including service as President of Alliance Quebec and Chair of the Board of Directors of the Ville Marie Social Services Centre, Selwyn House School and the YMCA of Quebec Foundation. He was a founding member of the Board of Directors of the Batshaw Youth and Family Centres. He serves on the Executive Committee of the Bureau de Coopération interuniversitaire and on the Board of the McGill Institute for the Study of Canada. In April 2018, he was appointed Chair of the Board of Directors of CBC/Radio-Canada.



Yolande James

Director, Bishop's Forum

Yolande James is a civil law graduate from the Université de Montréal and a holder of a common law degree from Queen's University. She was the recipient of the Senator Frank Carrel Scholarship and was called to the Quebec Bar in 2004.

Yolande was elected to the Quebec National Assembly for the riding of Nelligan in 2004 and was re-elected in 2007, 2008 and 2012. From 2005 to 2007 she was the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Immigration and Cultural Communities.

On April 18, 2007, she was appointed Minister of Immigration and Cultural Communities. As head of the department, at the height of the highly contentious Reasonable Accommodation debate, Yolande was mandated to implement the recommendations ordered by the Bouchard-Taylor Commission (notably implementing tools to better manage diversity).

Being aware of the challenges facing visible minorities, especially in their access to employment, she initiated, created and implemented the Valorisation Jeunesse Program with the objective of offering young people access to defining professional job opportunities. The program also helped to ensure that the workforce better reflect diversity.

In 2010, she was appointed Minister of Families, managing one of the government's most substantial portfolios after Health and Education. As head of this department, she overhauled the governance for subsidized daycare spots that are critically important to working families. Yolande was the first Black female Member of the National Assembly, as well as Quebec's first Black Cabinet Minister. She was Deputy House Leader for the Official Opposition from September 2012 to April 2013.

After the birth of her son, she left politics following the 2014 general election. Since leaving politics, Yolande works as a political analyst for a slew of different programs for the CBC (Canadian Broadcasting Corporation)-Radio Canada, including RDI's Les EX and CBC's Power and Politics.

In June 2021, Yolande was appointed Executive Director, Diversity and Inclusion, Radio-Canada.



Denise Lauzière

Associate Director, Bishop's Forum

Denise Lauzière joined Bishop's University in 2013. She is Interim Secretary General and Chief of Staff of the Office of the Principal & Vice-Chancellor. In 2003, after working for the Canadian Education Association in Toronto for 13 years as Director of Professional Development and Assistant Executive Director, Denise moved to Sherbrooke to take on the position of Executive Director of the Eastern Townships Alzheimer Society.

In 2005, she fulfilled a professional objective by attending law school. Denise graduated from l'Université de Sherbrooke in 2008 and has been a member of the Barreau du Québec since 2010. She practiced immigration law. Denise is a member since 2012 and a vice-president (2014) of the Ethics Committee for Research on Humans of the Research Centre of the Centre hospitalier universitaire de Sherbrooke (CIUSSS de l'Estrie – CHUS). She is also a member of the Board of Service d'aide aux Néo-Canadiens Sherbrooke.

Denise completed a Certificate in public administration at the École nationale d'administration publique in 2018.

Michael N. Bergman is the founder and principal of Bergman & Associates. Going on forty-five years of law practice, he has pleaded before the trial and appellate Courts of Québec, Ontario, Nova Scotia and Alberta, the trial and appellate Federal Courts, the Supreme Court of Canada, the United States District Court and diverse administrative bodies. M^e Bergman has represented clients and made presentations before committees of the House of Commons, Senate of Canada and National Assembly of Quebec.

M^e Bergman is a member of the Quebec Bar, the Ontario Bar, the Canadian Bar Association and the Association of Trial Lawyers of America. He served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Bar of Montreal for three years and was also its treasurer.

He is also a member of the executive of the Canadian Jewish Congress, Quebec Region; and a long-serving member of the Lord Redding Law Society Board of Directors.

M^e Bergman lectures in constitutional law and language rights at the McGill University Faculty of Law and frequently provides legal training to lawyers. He is a frequent speaker on diverse topics in various forums, and has spoken extensively regarding An Act respecting French, the official and common language of Québec (Bill 96.)

Elysia Bryan-Baynes

Communications Manager,
Canadian Race Relations Foundation

Elysia Bryan-Baynes spent eighteen years as a journalist and news anchor in Quebec.

In 2022 she was named a CBC Black Changemaker for her contributions to the Montreal and Black community.

Elysia hosted the community affairs show Focus Montreal, interviewing a range of political, artistic and business leaders for Global Television Montreal. For two years in 2010-2012, she covered one of her favourite sports – provincial politics – at the Quebec National Assembly.

While reporting the news is her first love, she made news herself in 2013 when she became the first Black woman to hold a permanent television news Anchor position in the Quebec market.

In the past few years, she has hosted events for the Black Theatre Workshop; an organization that honoured Elysia with the Victor Phillips award for young performers back in 1997.

In 2019, Elysia won the Gala Dynastie award for “best English-speaking television journalist”.

Elysia sits on the board of the Fraser Hickson Institute for literacy and is a Community Representative for the Royal West Academy High School governing board.

She also fills her days mentoring young journalists as part of the Canadian Association of Black Journalists' mentoring program and fencing at the Mont-Royal fencing club.

Elysia is currently the communications manager for the Canadian Race Relations Foundation, a Crown Corporation.

Mayor, City of Westmount

Christina Smith was first elected as City Councillor in 2013 and as Mayor of the City of Westmount in 2017.

Prior to entering municipal politics Christina was the Director of Industry and Government Affairs for Coca-Cola. Christina was also the Policy Advisor to the Federal Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs. Involved in many community organizations, Christina believes in civic engagement to ensure that her community is one where all residents benefit from a wide range of programs and services.

Christina hold a Bachelor of Political Science degree from Bishop's University.

Christopher Skeete is a member of the National Assembly (MNA) in the Quebec legislature. He is the youngest son of a family of two children, his father is from Trinidad and Tobago and his mother is French-Canadian.

He has been a member of the Coalition Avenir Quebec since its inception and was appointed, in 2012, vice-president of the CAQ for Quebec-west. Mr. Skeete was elected for the first time in 2018 as a MNA for the riding of Sainte-Rose, in Laval. This was his third candidacy after running unsuccessfully in 2012 in the riding of Vimont and 2014 in the riding of Fabre.

After his election in 2018, Mr. Skeete was nominated as Parliamentary Assistant to the Premier for Relations with English-Speaking Quebecers. This mandate aims at building bridges between the Quebec government and English-speaking communities of Quebec and Mr. Skeete has been working to enhance rapport between linguistic communities.

Since the beginning of his mandate, Mr. Skeete has served on various parliamentary committees including the Committee on Culture and Education and the Select Committee on the Sexual Exploitation of Minors. He has also been assigned by Premier Legault to an anti-racism task force to address the problem of racism in Quebec. This task force, which was formed the murder of George Floyd, aims at ending discrimination towards visible minority groups.

In February 2021, Premier Legault nominated Christopher Skeete as the Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister Responsible for the Fight Against Racism.

Sonja Solomun is a PhD candidate and Course Lecturer in the Department of Communication Studies at McGill University. She received her BA in Sociology from Bishop's University and her MA in Sociology from Queen's University. Sonja works at the intersection of critical digital media, cultural approaches to software, and science and technology studies. Broadly constituted, she is interested in the social and political implications of new forms of computational media, and the role and impact of algorithms on everyday life. Her dissertation research asks how the algorithmic architecture of social media platforms generate and renew historic forms of classification and control.

Sonja is a former Project Manager and Research Associate at Geothink, Canada's largest SSHRC Partnership Grant on digital democracy, and a co-editor of a volume of Geothink research, *Power and Justice: Cities, Citizens and Locational Technology*, under contract with UBC Press.

As a Research Fellow at the Max Bell School of Public Policy at McGill, Sonja works on digital democracy, disinformation and platform governance. Her future research projects explore the politics embedded in machine vision, through cultural histories of artificial intelligence and feminist science and technology studies.

Désirée McGraw

Parti libéral du Québec

Candidate for Notre-Dame-de-Grâce

Désirée McGraw was a senior policy advisor for international cooperation within Paul Martin's administration between 2003 and 2006, as well as interim Chief of Staff and Policy Director for the Minister of International Cooperation. The candidate tackled ambitious mandates mobilizing various stakeholders around a common vision.

Ms. McGraw has dedicated a major portion of her professional life to environmental causes, having worked with international environmental protection leaders such as Maurice Strong, David Suzuki, Elizabeth May and Al Gore. She was the co-founder of the Climate Reality Project for Canada in Montreal, President and Director General of the Aqua Forum organization which aims to get young people involved in developing innovative solutions for addressing Canada's freshwater issues.

In 2017, the Liberal candidate was appointed by Canada's Minister of the Environment and Climate Change as a special advisor to the CCICED. Désirée was also a member of several Canadian delegations to the United Nations, including the Nairobi Convention on Biodiversity in 2000 and the United Nations Convention on Climate Change in Kyoto. She worked as an environmental journalist and researcher for the United Nations from 1993 to 1997 and was a youth ambassador at the 1992 Earth Summit in Rio. Thanks to her experience in governmental relations and her dedication to the environment, Désirée McGraw will be able to foster collaboration among various sectors, disciplines, regions and generations in the fight against climate change.

As the former rector of Pearson College from 2015 to 2019, education is one of the main reasons that motivated her leap into active politics. She would like to contribute to building an education system that fosters collaboration, innovation and inclusion.

In addition to her university studies in Canada and abroad as a Commonwealth Scholar at the London School of Economics, the candidate from Notre-Dame-de-Grâce also completed leadership training at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government, at the Jackson School of International Affairs at Yale and the Désautels Management School at McGill.



Dr. Mélissa Généreux

Québec solidaire

Candidate for Saint-François

Dr. Mélissa Généreux is a public health specialist and associate professor at l'Université de Sherbrooke. After having worked as a public health director in the Eastern Townships for six years, she is now a medical advisor to the Eastern Townships Public Health Department. At the beginning of 2021, she participated in the implementation of a network of mental health scouts throughout Quebec. Her expertise in psychosocial impacts and crisis recovery is known throughout Quebec and internationally.

In addition to her numerous community involvements in the Eastern Townships, Dr. Généreux has regularly spoken out in the public arena, through numerous media relations, appearances in documentaries and major television programs, as well as through her weekly radio column on 107.7, which she recorded for several years.

Her experience in public health and in particular the COVID-19 pandemic have led her to take a critical look at the state of our health care system, where she notes shortcomings in prevention and in communication channels with the population. In a context of pandemic fatigue and polarization around public health issues, she wrote opinion letters advocating for coherent, collaborative practices that promote citizen participation. These reflections led her to run for Québec solidaire in Saint-François in 2022.

Yves Bérubé-Lauzière, an engineer-physicist, is a full professor in electrical and computer engineering at l'Université de Sherbrooke. He holds a Ph.D. in electrical engineering from McGill University for work in artificial vision done at the National Optics Institute in Quebec City, as well as a Master's degree in physics-mathematics from l'Université de Montréal for work in quantum optics. He also did doctoral studies in mathematics in Germany. A married father of three, Yves has been an assistant field hockey coach and manager of elite soccer teams. A project person and true leader, he notably led the biophotonics group at the National Optics Institute and was the director of the Bachelor's program in electrical engineering at l'Université de Sherbrooke. Since 2018, he has directed QSciTech, a project management and entrepreneurship training program for quantum technologies. Through these experiences, Yves has forged close ties with many companies, institutions and partners in the innovation field.

Furthermore, his government initiated an unprecedented labour mobility agreement between France and Québec, and was best known for a major initiative for the sustainable development of Northern Québec called "Plan Nord".

Lili-Anna Pereša
President and CEO
McConnell Foundation

Lili-Anna Pereša was named President and CEO of the McConnell Foundation in November 2020. Previously, she served as the President and Executive Director of Centraide of Greater Montreal for eight years.

The common thread in Lili-Anna's commitments and decades of leadership for various organizations (the YWCA of Montreal, the One Drop Foundation, and Amnesty International France) is to empower people, to contribute to the development of less privileged communities and to help improve the living conditions of the most vulnerable populations. Lili-Anna's years of humanitarian work (notably with CARE in Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina, with Oxfam in Burkina Faso, and as a science teacher in Malawi) have earned her numerous distinctions, including an honorary doctorate from the Université de Montréal, and an appointment as Knight of the Ordre National du Québec.

An engineer by training, Lili-Anna graduated from the École Polytechnique de Montréal in 1987 before going on to earn a graduate degree in management from McGill University and a master's degree in political science at the Sorbonne in Paris.



Stéphane Vaillancourt

President and CEO
YMCAs of Québec

With a Bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering from the École Polytechnique de Montréal and an MBA from McGill University, Stéphane Vaillancourt had a successful career at Bell Canada resulting in senior positions in Business development, Sales and Innovation.

In addition to his multiple professional and personal responsibilities, Mr. Vaillancourt has been involved for many years with various community organizations working with youth and seniors. Most notably, he was chair of the Board of Les Petits Frères, whose mission is to counter the isolation of the older people throughout their remaining years. He also chaired the board of Imagine Canada, a national charitable organization devoted to Canada's charities, and was Vice-Chair of Cybercap, an organization dedicated to the reinsertion of young adults in the workplace through multimedia.

Since November of 2002, Mr. Vaillancourt has been the President and CEO of the YMCAs of Québec, a charitable organization whose mission is to encourage and inspire all people to fulfill their potential, thrive and contribute to their community. As the first YMCA in North America, the YMCAs of Québec have been present in Montréal since 1851. They offer programs in more than 30 centres and points of service and virtually across the province, as well as operating an International Language School, YMCA Residence and Camp YMCA Kanawana. Thanks to partnerships with different levels of government and the generosity of its volunteers and donors, each year, the YMCA helps gather more than 100,000 people of all ages and backgrounds by giving them opportunities to learn, grow and develop their skills.

Jonathan Goldbloom has been providing executives and organizations with communications advice and support for more than three decades.

Jonathan led the award-winning campaign to keep the Shriners Hospital in Montreal as well as successful campaigns to secure psychologists the right to diagnose children with autism spectrum disorders and to expand access to English schools. Over the past two years he has been responsible for steering the CIUSSS West Central Montreal's communications activities related to the pandemic. At the same time, he has played a pivotal role in organizing Quebec's English-speaking community's response to Bill 96, An Act respecting French, the official and common language of Quebec, on behalf of the Quebec Community Groups Network (QCGN) including a rally and march attended by close to 5,000 Quebecers, and Bill 40, An Act to amend mainly the Education Act with regard to school organization and governance, on behalf of APPELE-Quebec. As a founder of Coalition Inclusion Quebec, he organized public hearings on Bill 21, an Act respecting the laicity of the State, and developed and implemented the organization's communications strategy. 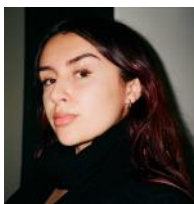

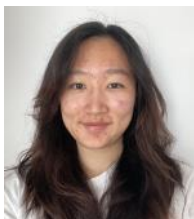
